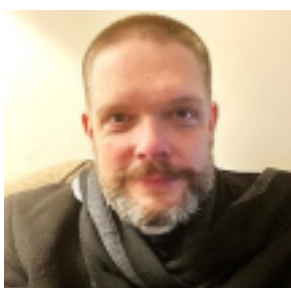

Dear friends

You may have seen a very strange individual wandering around

the place of late ... like something out of a movie, or a history book - a man, dressed in a grey habit with a black scapular (a kind of tabard).

Rather than anything particularly supernatural, it is just your Priest-in-Charge, dressed even more strangely than he already was. This is because during September, I became a novice of the Anglican Order of Cistercians, which is a group of men within the Church of England that follow a way of life and prayer inspired by the Cistercians, who have been around for centuries.

In truth, I feel like a bit of an idiot walking around dressed like this; but it does serve a purpose. Ironically, it makes it clear that I am useless! By this I mean that I have no useful purpose – I only exist to pray and to remind people of the reality and presence of God, and that they are loved passionately by that God. I am following this path because I've been called to it, mainly; but also because it brings me peace, hope and joy in a world where these are at a shortage. And I wear these robes and keep going on about it because I hope to point people in this part of the world – you, dear friends – towards the love of God.

So my prayer for you is not that you join my path (though you'd be most welcome), but that you find sure footing on your own path, a path that leads you through doubt and sadness and uncertainty, towards the love, hope and joy that can only be found in God. I'm sure that, like me, you're wondering how to make sense of the world post-pandemic, and in the midst of war in Ukraine, and now in the Middle East. These are scary times, and there is so much uncertainty, globally, and in our own personal, individual lives. The Christian faith is not a magic wand - I really wish it was, if I'm honest. But it does give a focus for today, hope for tomorrow, and it calls us back again and again to the source and foundation of all things - to what Christians call God.

As always, if you do ever want to know more about this, please do get in touch. And in the meantime, be assured by your 'useless' Priest, that I, and others in your Church, are praying for you every day.

TALES OF OLD HARLING 19 - Its lost lanes and hidden highways 4 The enigma of the 'Devil's Ditch

About a mile south of East Harling, along the Roman Road, is a junction known locally as 'the Five-ways'. Continue straight ahead for about 300 metres and you will find a narrow footpath on the left, which leads to an ancient earthwork marked on the O.S. Map as "Devil's Ditch". The Roman road continues straight ahead towards Gasthorpe.

This ancient "Ditch", originally a 'bank and ditch', once continued southwards for nearly 3 kilometres, but only an adjacent footpath marks its original course for much of the way. Most visible features of this northern section of the Devil's Ditch have disappeared except for a short length adjacent to the Roman Road, now hidden by a tree plantation and dense undergrowth. From here onwards the original bank and ditch have been destroyed but re-appear after about a kilometre where something resembling its original form appears as a sunken path with a short section of its original bank about 2 metres above. After rising to the top of a small hill, the bank slopes steeply away giving fine views eastwards, then drops down to cross the Diss—Thetford Road (B 1066). The 'ditch' continues for a short distance with, strangely, a BANK on both sides before disappearing into the marshy lands of the flood plains each side of the River Lt Ouse. The course of this earthwork continues from here as a **natural** defensive barrier across marshy land (which may well have been even more marshy in ancient times) to re-join the ROMAN road 6 Kilometres south of where it began at the Five-ways, forming a

defensive ARC.

The questions now, are---. How old is the Devils Ditch? What is it? Why is it here?

The Devil's Ditch is described as a '**defensive earthwork**' and limited archaeology has (very) broadly dated it **possibly iron -age but re-cut during the (Saxon) or Middle Saxon period**. i.e. the 'Dark Ages-- late 5th to late 9th century

The Iron Age and the Dark ages were periods of turmoil in the history of East Anglia. The Devil's Ditch is just one of six surviving defensive earthworks in Norfolk assumed to be part of a larger network of defence. Whatever it '**defended**' during the iron-age is lost in the mists of time. However, the period between the Romans leaving our shores and the Normans arriving 500 years later (the time when the Devil's Ditch was "re-cut") was perhaps the most 'troubled' in our history. Who knew from which direction a threat would come So--why can't these enigmatic defensive earthworks be more accurately dated to pinpoint whether they were dug to DEFEND ancient Britons against Saxon invaders, Saxon settlers against Viking invaders or Viking settlers against displaced Saxons?---each of whom had good reason to build defensive earthworks? Accurate dating of these earthworks will always be a problem because, by definition, they were built by local people under serious threat. They were constructed in a hurry. There was no time to drop coins, cooking pots or other dateable evidence for Archaeologists to find in the 21st century. Some earthworks seem to have been constructed to defend against attack from East, West, South or North-- depending on the

enemy's expected direction of attack at the time which, as we have seen, depends on accurate dating, thus creating more questions than answers!

Traditionally, these defensive earthworks spanned vulnerable ancient or Roman roads to defend towns or communities from enemy attack—starting and finishing at impenetrable natural barriers such as marshland or rivers, all making good military sense. That's exactly what the Devil's Ditch did, probably a number of times during its long history, from the iron-age to late Saxon times. BUT—could it have ever extended further northwards? To connect the Roman road at the Five-ways to the vulnerable River Thet? To form a defensive GATE across TWO important river routes instead of just one? Why would its builders leave a vulnerable 'gap' of just 2 kilometres between the Roman road at the Five-ways and the natural barrier of the marshlands of the River Thet at Middle Harling? I propose that the Devil's Ditch defensive network could once have extended this far. WHY?

After the Romans left Britain in the early 5th century, they left a political vacuum, soon filled by incursions from the Saxon culture by way of sea, rivers and the network of roads conveniently left by the Romans. This Saxon culture thrived for several hundred years centring around the two developing towns of Thetford and Norwich, which by the early 9th century had become extremely prosperous, thriving with rich merchants and Churches and Monasteries rich with silver and gold --thus becoming tempting targets for the growing army of VIKINGS who could attack both towns from north, south, east or west, by sea, by river or by road.--people could only guess from which direction they would attack. So--which way would the Devil's Ditch need to 'face'?? No one knew whether Thetford or Norwich would be targeted first so it would make sense to build defensive barriers against attack from all possible sides and to span all potential road and river routes. These earthworks wouldn't stop a determined army of marauding Vikings----but they would certainly slow them down! The Devil's Ditch was one of those earthworks. I believe it's possible that the Devil's Ditch network may have continued north--easterly for a further 2 kilometres to stop at the marshes of the River Thet at a point near West Harling. After all, those sneaky Vikings could have easily used the River Thet at this point as a back-door into Thetford! What's the evidence?

At the north-west 'corner' of the Five-ways, adjacent to the Roman Road, is a shallow ditch which drains the boggy land and springs of East Harling between the Poplars playing fields and Town Farm. This ditch crosses the West Harling Road where it finally runs into the boggy marshland of the River Thet. I believe this is a continuation of this important defensive network with the Devil's Ditch at its centre. If I am right then it creates a perfect system by defending a Roman road (possibly two) plus **TWO** Rivers, the Lt Ouse **and** the Thet. Why not? It becomes a perfect GATE between these two rivers with impenetrable marshland at each end. Both rivers meet in the very heart of Thetford at its most vulnerable point of Viking attack! If my assumptions are correct then the Devil's Ditch could have 'defended' Thetford **and** Norwich, or at least given warning of invasion to other villages within this 'land-between-two-rivers'--including The Harlings.

Eventually the Viking Great Army of several thousand men, DID successfully reach Thetford overwintering there in 869, after conquering York. The Viking's eventual route into this corner of East Anglia was probably from the West--by boat across The Wash then by river into THETFORD, via the River Ouse, but the villagers of The Harlings, Bridgham, Garboldisham, Riddlesworth and Rushford didn't know that when they constructed the defensive earthwork we now call the Devil's Ditch. **David Bailey**

GARDENING IN NOVEMBER

EAST HARLING

Vegetables: harvest whatever is ready. Plant individual garlic cloves 3cm deep and 15cm apart.

This month is very much weather led. Judging by the rest of the year we could have almost anything!

Learn to love slugs

Unless we have a very hard winter next year will be the year of the slug!

Molluscs are one of the oldest groups of organisms on earth. They first appeared about 540 million years ago, with terrestrial slugs and snails coming on the scene about 150 million years ago. The joke that a slug is a snail that has lost its shell is not far wrong, as they evolved from snail ancestors many times over their evolutionary history. This means that most slugs have a shell remnant, usually under the skin, with some visible on the outside.

There are more than 40 species found in Britain. All are hermaphroditic (with both male and female reproductive organs). Some such as the ghost slug (discovered in Wales in 2008) live mainly underground and are carnivorous, feeding mainly on earthworms. Others such as the large mottled Green Cellar Slug (found around compost heaps)

feed on decaying plants and animal material. Still others are omnivorous – feeding on whatever they can find – live plants, fungi, decaying plants and animals. They can cope with extremely cold weather by exploiting warmer garden microclimates such as sunny walls, compost heaps and underground.

Thanks to their wide-ranging diets, many species play an important role as detritivores – breaking down material and recycling nutrients back into the soil. They also provide a food source for wildlife. So, while some can be a nuisance, they are also an important part of garden ecosystems.

Ever wondered where those random seedlings that appear in your garden come from?

They are often spread by slugs – they are eaten then deposited in a different location, where they may germinate.

Jobs for this month

Borders: A good time to dig out new beds and borders. Weed several times before planting new shrubs, trees and perennials.

Lawns: Raise the mower blades a notch if you need to mow.

Trees, shrubs (including roses and deciduous hedging):

Bare rooted plants may be available this month onwards. They are much cheaper than their pot-grown counterparts. Stake trees to prevent rocking in the wind.

Cuttings: Hardwood cuttings of shrubs and trees including shrub roses can be taken.

Perennials: A good time for splitting and planting perennials including rhubarb

Short biennials: Don't let them get covered with fallen leaves.

Dahlias: if you have Harling soil (?) cut your dahlias down to the ground after the top growth turns black. Mark with a stick and forget about until the Spring. If you are in one of the parishes where the ground, gets waterlogged over the winter you may have to consider digging up the tubers and storing in damp sand or compost in a frost-free not hot) place until February.

Bulbs: Plant tulips. Check potted bulbs planted in September, and move any that are sprouting to a greenhouse, cold frame or cool well-lit room.

Fruit Trees: Begin winter pruning of established fruit trees (not stone fruit)

Seeds: There will be cold and wet days. That is a good time to browse the seed catalogues (either online or hard copies). Be wary of listings on eBay, and if tempted make sure they are seeds originating from the UK or EU] where disease controls are strict. Many of the diseases affecting well known plants and trees originated abroad,

General: Remove outdoor pot plants from saucers and

stand on pot-feet or bricks to prevent water-logging. Inspect your plant supports – there will be strong winds. Last year's hardwood cuttings should now be ready to pot on to bigger pots or planted out.

Put fallen leaves in small amounts into your compost heaps, or stack to rot down (slow) into leaf-mould.

Remove any large figs from your trees. Leave the small pea-sized ones for next year's fruit.

Remember if you have built a bonfire for 5 November check that nothing has crawled into it before you light it. It's always best to build a bonfire just before you light it.

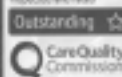

PS. Some questions for future historians:- Could there be a connection between Devil's Ditch and Bunn's Bank to the east of Attleborough? Bunn's Bank spans the same Roman Road as Devil's Ditch but 20 kilometres further North towards Norwich. Bunn's Bank forms a protective ARC around Attleborough that is much larger than the Devil's Ditch but in a similar defensive pattern, The Ditch and Bank of Bunn's Bank is much better preserved than the Devil's Ditch but has not been dated with any certainty i.e. **"--used as a park boundary in the 12th century—but could be older"---!**

Bunn's Bank is only recorded as about 4 kilometres in length---but in around 1970 I and Reg Clover, Chairman of the Thetford Historical Society located another circa 25 metres section of the Bank and ditch, in alignment, close to Flaxton Farm. This section was reported appropriately by Reg Clover but seemingly does not yet appear on any maps. If our supposition that this section belongs to the Bunn's Bank system is correct, then it makes a complete protective ARC of bank and ditch of nearly 7 kilometres!!! --- which would now encircle both Attleborough (Saxon) and Besthorpe (Viking) on the eastern side of the Roman Road.

EAST HARLING& KENNINGTHALL MEDICAL PRACTICE

The Practice has remained extremely busy throughout the Summer, with some days seeing telephone call volumes closer to what would be expected during the Winter. The number of incoming telephone calls answered in August was 3,848. The number of total clinician appointments booked was 4,160, which was an increase of over 26% compared with July. Regrettably 155 of the appointments booked were not attended, and, as the Practice was not advised in advance, these appointments were lost.

The financial cost to the NHS of these lost appointments was approximately £5,000 in 1 month alone, and equates to approximately 6 full days of one clinician's appointments.

Patients receive a text message confirmation/reminder for all appointments booked, which now includes a link for the patient to cancel the appointment. Our website also offers patients a channel to cancel unwanted appointments – simply type "cancel" into the search bar of our website and complete the "Cancel an Appointment" form. This facility is available 24/7.

The Dispensaries at both sites have also been very busy, once again seeing a significant increase in the number of items dispensed in August. Please allow 5 working days for repeat prescriptions. Please also remember that Option 2 on the telephone is for repeat prescription requests. There will be little or no call waiting time on option 2. To save having to telephone your repeat prescription through, patients who collect their prescriptions at our East Harling and Kenninghall dispensaries can opt for a managed repeat prescription service – please ask at one of our dispensaries for more information.

We have completed further recruitment at the Practice over the Summer, with new staff joining the Practice Support Team, and new staff due to start in our Dispensary in September. We have also been extremely fortunate to have Joanna, Alex and Emma join the Practice Nursing Team. All 3 bring considerable experience and expertise to the Practice, and this recruitment brings a significant increase in the total number of nursing appointments we can now offer our patients.

As Winter approaches we enter another season of Covid-19 and flu immunisations. As was the case last year, the Practice will not be offering the Covid-19 immunisations at the Practice, but patients qualifying for Covid-19 vaccination

Practice will be administering flu vaccinations to qualifying patients, initially on Saturday 4th and Saturday 11th October 2023 at our East Harling site. Qualifying patients will be receiving a text message inviting them to book directly into one of these clinics. Subsequently, patients will be able to book into these clinics via our Reception Team.

Choose your repertoire carefully - Start off with less complicated music as not everyone can or should be able to read music, though everyone can sing.

Be open to everyone - It's a really good idea to keep your choir un-auditioned and open to all. Everyone can find their singing voice – sometimes the opportunity and a little encouragement from others is all they need!

Use tools available to you – use local church hymn book and what is available online. Then print copies for the choir

members so they can even highlight certain lines to help perfect harmonies and in-the-round singing.

Don't forget the warm-up! - Getting the voice and brain warmed up is vital if you want to make the most out of rehearsals. Take a look at Singing Warm-ups for some really great warm-up songs on YouTube.

Short and sweet - Keep rehearsals snappy and varied. Aim for 1 hour (including a warm-up), and work at a small selection of songs – something to suit all tastes!

Our pop-up choir in Garboldisham was approximately 45% non-church people which we were not expecting – but were delighted about. Christmas worship was transformed by having our choir, and forged links with new friends in the area around, with very little effort. We have since practised and performed for our Easter Service in April 2023 to welcome our new Curate Josh and his family to the Benefice.

I am in the process now of setting up a Benefice pop-up choir in East Harling – (rehearsals start on Thursday 19th October at 7.30 in East Harling Church) so do come along on a Thursday thereafter. We will perform in November 2023 at one of our special Benefice services. It's a great opportunity to meet new people singing together, as well as it being another way to support all the churches within our Benefice to fellowship together. _____

"Men of Dunwich, The Story of a Vanished Town" by Rowland Parker
